SPECIALTY training

Your specialty training years are demanding. They will challenge your character, your mind and your heart, but with this hard work and vast learning experience comes the unique reward of directly improving and saving people's lives. Despite this being challenging, you will be supported all the way.

When choosing where to train, you are choosing a place to call home for the foreseeable future. The training has to be outstanding and your surroundings have to match up to the job. We know our region has it all, and choosing us could be the best decision you make.

Our outstanding training practice and extended learning opportunities make our NHS trusts very special places to undertake your medical training. We offer a range of options, in addition to your medical training, to help you progress and become an exceptional leader, as well as a highly-competent medical professional. Known as the 'pyramids', this programme consists of four areas that cover: professionalism; teaching, training and supervision; leadership and management; and research and academic training.

As a specialty trainee you will be employed by a single employer called the Lead Employer Trust (LET). The LET is there to help make sure all your employment, whilst in training, runs smoothly. From looking after all of your statutory rights and payroll to looking into flexible options for your training such as working part-time if you need to achieve a work-life balance.

GP training

GPs who train in the North East and North Cumbria get much more than just high quality training. In addition to our first-class exam preparation, excellent clinical and academic supervision and the breadth of experience offered by our trainers, we can give you lots of personal support.

You can be reassured that whatever you come up against as a GP trainee here you can rely on us for help. Part of this support includes an extensive mentoring support network and an expert career advice service.

Our training programmes offer high quality taught courses and we offer a complete range of experiences in general practice from stunning rural areas to vibrant inner city areas. There are a wide variety of selected and supervised hospital posts too, as well as a large and growing number of integrated training posts.

Throughout your GP training period, you will have the highest standards of educational supervision and will attend a weekly half day release course provided by your training programme or equivalent. All our GP trainees have been allocated their first choice of training programme.

Trainees can apply for time out from their training programme (6-12 months) to undertake research, take a planned career break and to pursue other clinical experiences. There are lots of academic opportunities for trainees interested in research, education, leadership and commissioning. Global health fellowships are also available.

arts and CULTURE

Since spreading its wings in February 1998, Antony Gormley's The Angel of the North has become one of the most talked about pieces of public art ever produced. But that's only the beginning of the thriving art and culture scene in our region.

We have several booming cultural hubs offering a unique insight into England's artistic identity. From Gateshead's Baltic Centre for Contemporary Art and Middlesbrough's Institute of Modern Art, to the 'living' Beamish Museum, we have an abundance of creative institutions that have transformed the North East's cultural landscape.

Hailed as Newcastle's answer to London's Shoreditch (but for half the price!), one of the most exciting cultural hubs in the region has to be Newcastle's Ouseburn Valley. Its thriving social and cultural venues include artists' studios, the Seven Stories National Centre for Children's Books and the one-of-a-kind Star and Shadow cinema, which exist harmoniously alongside reminders of the area's industrial past.

No tour of our region's cultural hotspots would be complete without a nod to Norman Foster's iconic Sage music centre in Gateshead. This landmark live music venue brings the world's finest artists, musicians and bands to the banks of the River Tyne in an architecturally stunning building rivalling anything of its kind in the world.

Every two years, artists from around the world illuminate our city of Durham in delightful and unexpected ways, with a spectacular series of light installations to create the UK's largest light festival – LUMIERE.

For a good red Shill's of Cockermouth, Lake District - two floors of delights! Downstairs the home of artisan cheese, fine wine and handcrafted chocolates. Upstairs serving coffee, tapas and wine.

For something fizzy Ebony Champagne Bar, Durham - with around a dozen different types of vintage and non-vintage bubbly.

The cosy pubs with roaring fires that welcome you in with locally-grown food at the end of your Sunday afternoon stomp across the hills; the farmers' markets with their friendly banter and traders eager for their passion to rub off on you; and the fresh seafood caught from and served against the backdrop of the coast you've just meandered along.

Foodies are spoilt for choice with great local produce on offer in every corner of our region. From kippers to casks, if you can grow it, churn it, press it or distil it, chances are a local artisan somewhere is on the case, particularly in Northumberland and Cumbria where buying local is a way of life.

Our top tips for tucking in:

For a special occassion The Raby Hunt, Summerhouse, Darlington - at the Raby Hunt 'Kitchen Table' you can experience a 13-15 course tasting menu with a stunning view of a two Michelin Star kitchen at work. Watch Good Food Guide Chef of the Year, James Close, and his team plating up while you dine.

For afternoon tea South Causey Inn, near Durham - nestled within the stunning Beamish Valley, the afternoon tea here is presented on a tiny picnic bench packed with yummy treats. With beautiful gardens for the summer and log fires for the winter, it's a great place to spend a few hours.

For a trendy Italian Cena, Yarm, Teesside - a modern café, with painted chairs, limed wood, a mural of Venice and last, but not least, a big wood-fired pizza oven.

For a lunch after a ramble The Drunken Duck, Ambleside, Cumbria - perched high in Barngates outside Ambleside, the Drunken Duck is famous for its top-notch food, beer and relaxed atmosphere.

For a Michelin star House of Tides, Newcastle - a family run restaurant set within the beautifully restored Grade I listed 16th Century former merchant's town house on the historical Newcastle Quayside with a Michelin star and 4 AA Rosette awards.

The perception that to travel between parts of our region requires a flask and a blanket is incorrect. You can in fact travel between most of our major towns and cities by car in under an hour - less time than it takes to get across London.

Newcastle Airport was recently voted as one of the finest on earth. In early 2018, our friendly and efficient Geordie transportation hub was named best in its category in the annual Airport Service Quality Awards meaning that it is judged to be the best small airport for customer service in Europe.

Did you know?

It is estimated that 85% of the UK population has never seen a truly dark sky. At Kielder, the skies can be so dark that the Milky Way and even the planet Jupiter can cast shadows.

a nature lover's PARADISE

Did you know that the rural areas of Northumberland National Park and Kielder Water and Forest Park have the darkest skies in England?

1,500 square kilometres of Northumberland has been designated an area to conserve and enjoy, making Northumberland, Europe's largest Dark Sky Park and Kielder Forest the third largest protected Dark Sky reserve in the world.

Kielder Forest is famous for the impressive Kielder Observatory. Like the deck of a ship sailing above the landscape, the observatory provides astronomers with a permanent facility in the heart of Northumberland.

Back down to earth, there are plenty of Mother Nature's terrestrial wonders to discover too. You don't get puffins everywhere, but you do get them (in their thousands!) at the Farne Islands off the Northumberland coast where you'd be hard-pushed to find anywhere better to see them up close.



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
